Wastewater Treatment Plant honored with Outstanding Performance Award



This month, the Washington State Department of Ecology (DOE) announced the City of North Bend Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) was honored with the Wastewater Treatment Plant Outstanding Performance Award.

Of approximately 300 wastewater treatment plants statewide, North Bend's plant was among the top treatment plant operations in 2024. DOE staff evaluated plants for compliance by regularly meeting permit criteria, conducting monitoring and reporting data.

Washington State DOE Water Quality Program Manager Joe Kenning commented, "Ecology acknowledges the exceptional level of effort required to protect water quality and provide this critical service to the communities you serve. Dedicated and proficient operators are essential to successful plant operations and to protecting the health of Washington's waters."

In 2024, the City of North Bend celebrated the completion of its largest ever capital project, WWTP High Priority Improvements. Wastewater treatment facilities are essential for maintaining a healthy

ecosystem, preventing disease, and ensuring safe water for our community. Improvements also add the ability to take additional capacity, such as the Meadowbrook Sewer Utility Local Improvement District, a ULID that will expand public sewer throughout the western portion of the City.

Approximately 80 percent of residents are currently connected to the Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP), with about 20 percent remaining on private septic drain fields.



"We are proud to receive this recognition. We attribute it to North Bend's dedicated wastewater treatment team, whose passion, professionalism and daily commitment to water quality protection set the standard for excellence," said Mayor Miller.



Infrastructure Projects

North Bend transportation improvements to watch for this month



From 3 feet of walking space along this busy stretch of WSDOT-owned road in Downtown North Bend, to an ADA accessible sidewalk, we hope you have a chance to take a walk in the Historic District and check it out this month. The project is a result of a \$157,435 WA State Transportation Improvement Board (TIB) grant.



THRASHER AVE SIDEWALK GAP REMOVAL PROJECT

The result of this project will be a new sidewalk on the east side of Thrasher Avenue NE, with curb, gutter and stormwater improvements.

Continuing pedestrian safety improvements from this location, residents can expect additional improvements to the North Bend Way and Thrasher Avenue intersection.

SE 140TH ST SIDEWALK GAP REMOVAL PROJECT

Crews are still hard at work, improving connectivity and walking conditions along SE 140th St.

The final portion of the project involves installing a 5-foot-wide asphalt trail connecting to the sidewalk. The trail will end at Tanner Rd. Asphalt work will begin in early September.

5TH, 6TH & MAIN AVE IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

In August, crews began work in the Old Silver Creek neighborhood: a sidewalk for 5th St, 6th St and Main Ave.

The project will include storm drainage and conveyance pipes, curbs, gutters and longer lifespan ductile iron water pipes.

Crews are currently working on water main installation.

North Bend's Water Conservation Ordinance

What it means, why we have it, and how to comply with each stage

As climate change continues to impact King County and the Pacific Northwest region, more communities are participating in water conservation. The City of North Bend is at the forefront of these efforts.

The city pursues conservation in a variety of ways: through ongoing distribution system leak reduction efforts, environmental Wastewater Treatment Plant infrastructure upgrades, customer conservation education, watermain replacement, and what began in 2020, the Water Conservation Ordinance (WCO).

The WCO is a positive way to actively make a difference in water conservation. The preceding winter had a lower snowpack than average in the Snoqualmie River Watershed. With warmer temperatures at higher elevations this spring, snowpack throughout the upper watershed of the Snoqualmie River melted faster than usual.

Additionally, the past few months have had very little precipitation.

Beginning August 20, Stage 2 of the City's WCO went into effect.

The WCO pertains to all property owners inside city limits and all City of North Bend water customers inside or outside city limits. For some, this ordinance is an anticipated seasonal practice in our community, and for others, the WCO is new and as a participant, we understand new residents want to ensure they have all the information they need to join in water conservation efforts.

Your work to help conserve water and protect the Snoqualmie River is appreciated!

Stage 2


- Water between 6 p.m. & 10 a.m.
- Irrigate 3 times weekly
- Water only served upon request at restaurants
- No city water will be used for construction purposes without prior approval

- What to do at Stage 2 - Water Conservation Ordinance

- ✓ Water landscape a max of **3 days** per week
 - ➡ WHAT DAYS TO WATER: Odd street addresses - Tues, Thurs, Sat
Even street addresses - Weds, Fri, Sun
- ✓ **No irrigation on Mondays**
- ✓ Water between **6 PM & 10 AM**
- ✗✗ Do you use drip irrigation only? If so, you are exempt from the WCO
- ✓ Water is served **upon request** at restaurants
- ✓ **No hardscape surface washing**, except for health, sanitation, fire protection
