Quarterly Message from the Mayor

The weather may not always show it, but spring is here. That means we have officially passed the one-year anniversary of the Coronavirus Pandemic stopping the world in its tracks. What a difference a year makes. Last spring was dominated by fear and uncertainty. This

spring brings the hope for a return to normalcy with three Covid-19 vaccines spurring positivity.

At our recent virtual quarterly staff luncheon we shared some positive effects we have experienced this past year, living and working in a different way. I encourage you all to do the same – you might be surprised by your answers.

Although it may still be a few months before we see each other mask-less, we are beginning the initial planning work to reopen City Hall to the public. We are cautious and meticulous in our planning so that

we do not reopen before more staff members are fully vaccinated. But rest assured, we are planning. We miss welcoming residents into our still-new City Hall and holding meetings in Council Chambers - and look forward to eventually taking those closed signs off the front doors.

As we move into the 2nd quarter of 2021, we wanted to look back at the last quarter and highlight City accomplishments. For a full year now, City staff and elected officials have been working in a new environment. Despite the on-going pandemic, many milestones and achievements were marked.

Infrastructure

In March, we received the news that our Water System Plan (WSP) received final approval from the State Dept. of Health. The WSP outlines our

5-year plan – consistent with Growth Management requirements and other state law – to deliver safe and reliable drinking water to our current and future customers, which includes both City residents and Unincorporated King County residents. The plan provides a detailed overview of our facilities, procedures, policy and future actions that will guide important future infrastructure projects that ensure we meet our legal obligations to provide water to our customers and residents.



To achieve our goal of water security, we continue evaluating multiple long-term mitigation water options to meet all future requirements of our Centennial Well Water Right, including renewed negotiations with the Sallal Water Association for a wholesale water / mitigation contract.

We also continue evaluating alternative mitigation projects.

Phase 1 of the Wastewater Treatment Plant (WWTP) High Priority Improvements project is over 90% complete and Phase 2 design is 50% complete. In



March, City Council approved new sewer rates and General Facilities Charges that will complete the funding through a 30-year low interest bond. While the

rate increase was small, your Councilmembers did not take this lightly, but realized these overdue WWTP improvements were critical for our City, the environment and employees. These improvements add redundancy, improve employee safety, increase treatment and hydraulic capacities, replace aging facilities and make important environmental updates that meet strict Department of Ecology requirements to protect the Snoqualmie River. Of special note, we are also working with a local nonprofit – North Bend Art and Industry – on plans to add a mural to the new WWTP clarifier tank that fronts SR 202. Look for additional details on that in the coming months.

On the transportation front, we are making progress on designs for a new roundabout on Bendigo Blvd and Mt. Si Blvd, with the goal to ease traffic near the I-90 exit 31 on and off-ramps and improve the entrance to the Outlet Mall. Design is expected to start in 2022.

We are currently beginning traffic analysis with WSDOT, engineering design and permitting. A \$1.4 million grant is funding this design work, which coincides with Simon Properties planning a redesign of the Outlet Mall that will likely lead to more on-site hospitality and restaurant uses.

The contract for the Park Street Overlay project which will install approximately 1,700 linear feet of full width overlay on E. Park Street is nearing approval. The project also includes lane configuration and channelization that when complete will create a separate left/thru lane and right turn lane on westbound Park Street. Construction is anticipated to start later this summer.

To increase pedestrian safety, we are beginning initial design work for a new crosswalk at Cedar Falls Way and Maloney Grove Ave. As part of our sidewalk reinvestment program, later this spring parts of the Forester Woods neighborhood will have some

sidewalks reconstructed. We have also started design work for downtown sidewalk improvements on E. 2nd Street – and thanks to generous donations by local businesses, Fury Site Works and Rainier Asphalt, a 400 ft. extension was added to the eastern end of Tanner Trail.

Community Development Projects

I would also like to share updates on some of the more noticeable development projects you see happening around town.

If you have not already heard the buzz, a new butcher shop / deli is coming to the historic downtown core this spring / summer.

Falling River Meats is currently remodeling the former ProSki

space on North Bend Way. The local Snoqualmie Valley business specializes in humanely raised and locally sourced meats.

Work resumed this month at the Dahlgren property. Crews are beginning utility work, installing watermain pipe to connect to the Centennial Well located underneath our Public Works building. This work is happening along North Bend Way and traffic control measures are in place. This project will bring 212 new multi-family homes to our City, along with a new 4-acre city park that will connect to King County's Tanner Landing Park to provide direct access to Middle Fork Snoqualmie River.

Work continues on the new Karakoram Snowboard Bindings headquarters on North Bend Way behind the Napa Auto Parts store.

Phoenix Plaza received its Temporary Occupancy Certificate last quarter and is now actively renting out retail space and apartments.


You may have noticed some home removal happening on E. Park Street last month. This work is in preparation for a new 28-unit condominium townhome project which will be built by Pulte Homes. Construction is anticipated to start this spring.

The brand new Torguson Skatepark opened earlier this month, with final landscaping work in progress. We are very excited to add this outdoor park amenity to North Bend.

Work also continues on the future Snoqualmie Valley Athletic Complex along SR 202 near Encompass. This private sporting complex will increase field space in the Snoqualmie Valley and attract customers to our local businesses.

Community Engagement, Local Business Support

As I'm sure you are aware, King County moved to Phase 3 of Washington State's Roadmap to Recovery Reopening Plan, which expands capacity to 50% for our local businesses and allows spectators back to local sporting events in a limited capacity. This is great news for our businesses. This move was possible due to declining Covid activity and increasing vaccinations countywide.

The community support of local businesses has been impressive. All winter residents have shopped and eaten locally to keep their favorite restaurants and shops afloat. I encourage you to keep shopping and eating locally. Although capacity restrictions are loosening, our businesses have weathered unprecedented losses and need your continued support to rebound.

Remember, staying in phase 3 is not guaranteed. We must continue to do our part – masking up, spreading out and keeping social circles small – to keep supporting our community businesses and preventing a move backward to phase 2.

On the community engagement front, we are very grateful for the hard work of Eastside Fire & Rescue, which has been assisting with mobile Covid-19 vaccinations of our most at-risk community members. EF&R has spent the past 3 months carefully planning, training and executing vaccinations to protect the North Bend community. Their efforts are helping us reopen and valued community members regain normalcy in their daily lives.



As we progress deeper into 2021, we remain positive and hopeful – knowing we are moving in the right direction. City staff and your elected officials continue with our mission to support and enhance this highly livable community. By working in partnership with our residents, our goals can be achieved, and this beautiful small mountain town will continue to be the unique, vibrant place that we are lucky enough to call home.

State and Local Covid-19 Vaccination Update



As of April 26, over 5.2 million vaccine doses have been given across the state, which is 81% of the approximate 6.4 million doses that have been delivered to providers and long-term care programs. In King County, nearly 1.9 million doses have been administered. In North Bend zip code 98045, 57.7% of those 16 and over have received at least one dose – and 35.3% are now fully vaccinated. Washington State is currently averaging 61,000 daily administered vaccine doses and 29% of residents have been fully vaccinated. The new Lake Sammamish State Park Mass Vaccination site has approximately 1,300 open appointments. Find a Covid-19 vaccine [here](#).

North Bend Covid-19 Activity Update

North Bend Covid-19 activity was flat this past week.

Over the past 14 days there were 4 new cases reported and the test positivity rate was 1.9%. The City's 7-day daily case average was also flat at .04.

Neighboring Snoqualmie's recent uptick in cases also continues, with 19 new cases reported and a 6.9% test positivity rate over the past two weeks.

This continued activity in the upper Snoqualmie Valley is an important reminder that despite vaccine rollout, the virus continues to circulate in our area. Until more residents are fully vaccinated, it is important to continue following all public health guidelines – spread out, mask up and keep social circles small – to #KeepNorthBendHealthy and help prevent King County from moving back to Phase 2 of the State's Reopening Plan.

New to Downtown North Bend: Falling River Meats

There will soon be a new storefront addition to the historic North Bend downtown core: [Falling River Meats](#), a Snoqualmie Valley business that specializes in locally sourced, humanely raised meats.

The new store is a great example of the type of businesses the City's Community and Economic Development Department and volunteer Economic Development Commission have been working to attract to the revitalized downtown area to serve the needs of North Bend residents.

Since 2016, family-owned Falling River Meats has operated using a farm-to-door online model but this spring it will relocate to downtown North Bend. Owner Christeena Marzolf said she and her husband Darron – a 4th generation butcher – are excited about the move. Construction is currently underway to turn the former ProSki retail space on North Bend Way into a retail

butcher shop / deli. The building is owned by North Bend native Craig Glazier of Carbonite Properties.

Craig explained, "After 2 years of searching for a long-term, sustainable local small business for the former ProSki location, I was absolutely thrilled to come across the Marzolf family and learn about their Falling River Meats business and their plans to open a butcher shop in historic downtown North Bend. Christeena and Darron are genuine, hard-working people

and I'm sure the local community will pack their store as soon as they're open."

Falling River Meats will offer both fresh and frozen meats, along with select seafood. All meat and seafood will come from local, sustainable and



humanely raised / caught sources. There will also be prepared foods, cured meats, charcuterie boards, raw pet food and treats and other locally grown or made products. And for residents who feel like learning, there will also be classes and tastings.

The Marzolf's say they are passionate about local meats and showcasing the hard work of local farmers. The couple also raise animals in the Snoqualmie Valley and are active in the farming community, with Darron currently serving on the King County Agricultural Commission and Christeena just recently stepping down from the Sno-Valley Tilth Board after seven years of service.

Falling River Meats is anticipated to open in late May or early June.

Ignite Dance & Yoga Owners Fire Up a New Cafe in Town - Ignition

About 15 years ago, before they were married, locals Gavin and Katie Black dreamed of opening a cozy little bar. Life took them on a different path, and the couple opened IGNITE Dance & Yoga in 2010.

That year was a tough year to open a business, but little did they know that March 2020 would be an even tougher year to open their dream second business, Ignition. They signed the lease for their new space right before everything shut down due to the virus.

Covid restrictions have made the timing of opening a café tricky, but it has allowed the Blacks to really develop the space better than they had originally imagined.

The inside is warm and inviting, with a beautiful wooden bar with vintage accents and beautiful stained-glass details throughout. Seating will include a large bench seat with tables and chairs, bar seating, and a high-top table option, giving customers multiple options.

The patio is their next focus, which will be done over the next month. The mountain views from inside are incredible and even more expansive from the soon-to-be-done outdoor patio space. They hope to be ready to open by May.

The food will be high-quality, healthy options, including paninis, salads, soups, grain bowls, empanadas, all-day breakfast, healthy smoothies, acai bowls, and snack options. They will have great appetizers – a cheese plate, charcuterie board, olive tapenade, hummus, tzatziki and more. All this includes vegetarian, vegan, and gluten-free options.

As for drinks, they've partnered with Marta Rothnie of Snoqualmie's Dark Horse Brew, who will be roasting their own Ignition beans, and they will include a full coffee and tea menu, beer on draft, including a local handle from Volition, and great wine options including some local favorites like Pearl & Sigillo.

When asked how community support has been, the answer was a resounding "Outstanding!" They say they've loved living and working in the community for the last 12 years, and the response to Ignition has warmed their hearts. TRAFFIC UPDATE: MAJOR SR 202 PAVING PROJECT KICKS OFF WITH SNOQUALMIE RIVER BRIDGE CLOSURE, MAY 10 - 14

Snoqualmie Falls to the western edge of North Bend. This work will require a full closure of the SR 202 Snoqualmie River bridge, weather dependent: 10 p.m. May 10 to 4 a.m. May 14. Travelers should plan for additional travel time of approximately 25-30 minutes for the detour route: NOTE: Closure starts between the Tokul Roundabout and the SR 202 bridge, which still provides local access to Millpond Road. PAYCHECK PROTECTION PROGRAM (PPP)

FROM THE SMALL BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION (SBA) - The Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) is a loan designed to provide a direct incentive for small businesses to keep their workers on payroll. Borrowers may be eligible for PPP loan forgiveness.

ECONOMIC INJURY DISASTER (EIDL) LOAN

FROM THE SBA - The deadline to apply for the Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) program for the Covid-19 Pandemic disaster declaration is extended to **Dec. 31, 2021**, pending the availability of funds.

To date, the SBA has approved \$197 billion in low-interest loans which provides working capital funds to small businesses, non-profits and agricultural businesses.

Loans are offered with a 3.75% interest rate for small businesses and 2.75% interest rate for nonprofit organizations, a 30-year maturity, and an automatic deferment of one year before monthly payments begin.

TARGETED EIDL ADVANCE (GRANT)

FROM THE SBA - Covid-19 [Targeted EIDL Advance](#) was signed into law on Dec. 27, 2020, as part of the Economic Aid to Hard-Hit Small Businesses, Non-Profits, and Venues Act. The Targeted EIDL Advance provides businesses located in low-income communities with additional funds to ensure small business continuity, adaptation, and resiliency.

PERSONAL PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT (PPE)

THE RESTAURANT REVITALIZATION FUND (RRF) - FROM THE WA OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR - signed into law on March 11, 2021, Congress appropriated \$28.6 billion for the SBA to award emergency assistance for eligible restaurants, bars, and other qualifying businesses impacted by COVID-19.

Fund recipients are not required to repay the funding as long as the funds are used for eligible purposes no later than **March 11, 2023**. Registration for application portal begins **April 30**, at 6 a.m. PST. The SBA will begin accepting applications via the portal on **May 3**, at 9 a.m. PST. DEPARTMENT OF CHILDREN, YOUTH AND FAMILIES SPRING 2021 CHILD CARE COVID-19 GRANT PORTAL OPEN - FROM THE WA OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR - To ensure a stable, functional and flexible child care system that supports providers and families during the COVID-19 pandemic, the Department of Children, Youth, and Families (DCYF) is providing direct support to licensed child care providers to offset increased costs associated with the COVID-19 pandemic and ensure child care services are available to families.

All licensed child care providers ready and able to serve children are eligible to apply.
