Proclamation

WHEREAS, the history of North Bend is closely tied to its strategic location as a gateway between Puget Sound and the Cascade Mountains encompassing transportation routes from early foot trails to wagon roads, to railroads and highways; and

WHEREAS, prospectors, railroad scouts, and military men were the first non-natives to explore the area around North Bend in the 1850s and by the 1860s Euro-American settlers had discovered the prairie and its agricultural potential; and

WHEREAS, the North Bend area remained largely inaccessible to commerce until the arrival of the Seattle, Lake Shore & Eastern Railroad; and

WHEREAS, the settlement continued to grow as the railroad encouraged the development of the area's resource industries resulting in the community's incorporation on March 12, 1909; and


WHEREAS, over the ensuing 100 years, North Bend has played a significant role in shaping the character of King County in its role as a gateway community, and
