

SNOQUALMIE VALLEY REGIONAL TRAIL

facts

The Snoqualmie Valley Trail offers the opportunity to get out and explore one of the most beautiful agricultural valleys in the region. Along the way, explore the cities of Duvall, Carnation, Snoqualmie and North Bend and the town of Fall City.

TRAIL DETAILS

- **Length:** 31.5 miles
- **Surface:** Crushed rock and original ballast surfacing. Former railroad trestles have been decked and hand railed from Duvall to Rattlesnake Lake with one on-road detour in the City of Snoqualmie.

- **Accessibility:** Due to the crushed rock surface, the trail is not readily accessible to people in wheelchairs.
- **Users:** Frequent users include mountain bikers, hikers, horseback riders, birders, walkers and more!

Snoqualmie Valley Trail is flat from Duvall to Fall City with a minor elevation gain of 165 feet from Fall City to Snoqualmie.

SNOQUALMIE WATERSHED FACTS

- The Snoqualmie Watershed encompasses 680 square miles - 433,000 acres.
- The river meanders more than 43 miles from the Snoqualmie Falls to the confluence with the Skykomish River.
- The watershed supports wild runs of coho, chinook, pink, chum and steelhead.
- Land use in the Snoqualmie Watershed: 17,000 acres agriculture, 333,000 acres forest, 69,000 acres rural residential and 14,000 acres urban.
- Tributaries to the Snohomish/Snoqualmie Basin produce 25-50% of all Puget Sound adult coho salmon.
